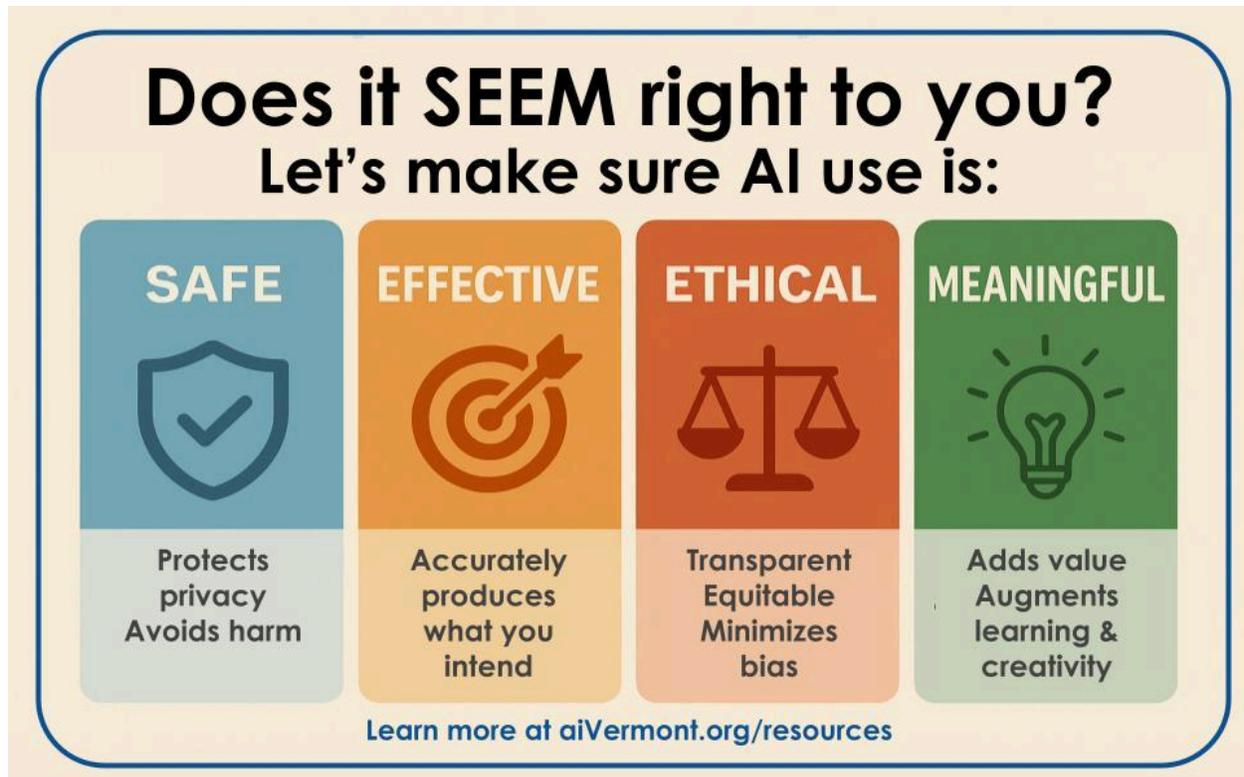


What is AI Literacy?



A person who is AI literate will be able to...

- **recognize and evaluate AI-generated content**, distinguishing it from human work and judging its accuracy and intent.
- **use AI tools effectively and purposefully**, crafting prompts and applying AI to enhance learning, creativity, and productivity.
- **think critically and ethically about AI**, understanding its social, environmental, and moral implications and using it responsibly.
- **understand how AI works and its limits**, knowing what it can and cannot do and where it is most useful.
- **navigate AI in context and community**, discussing its impacts, helping others use it wisely, and engaging with policy and media issues.
- **maintain human agency and judgment**, making informed choices, personalizing AI outputs, and deciding what to share or trust.

Using AI should promote, not diminish, essential human skills like critical thinking, problem solving, communication, creativity, collaboration, empathy, adaptability, and self-direction.

Human Intelligence and Artificial Intelligence Compared

Recognizing and understanding the strengths of HI vs AI will help you **make better decisions and avoid predictable mistakes**. Consider what each is best at to avoid overly trusting or underusing one or the other. Protect what matters most in work and life: relationships, meaning, and ethical actions.

Domain / Task	HI Strengths	AI Strengths
Creativity & Content Generation	Intentional, purposeful creativity, embedded with personal and cultural meaning, lived experience, originality	Rapid & scalable drafting of text, images, music, video, etc. with limitless variations blending diverse styles
Pattern Recognition	Uses context and experience to interpret ambiguous or novel patterns; applies common sense	Detects tiny variations, repetitive patterns, anomalies (e.g., fraud detection, medical scans)
Image & Sound Recognition	Recognizes blurred, partial, and unusual signals, puts in context	Extremely accurate in trained domains; can process at massive scale
Repetitive & Routine Tasks	Flexible when tasks change suddenly; adapts to unforeseen disruptions	Fast, tireless, consistent; no fatigue or boredom
Language Translation	Captures nuance, cultural context, tone, humor, and layered meanings	Recognizes hundreds of languages, speed and consistency
Learning & Self-Improvement	Few-shot learning; transfer across domains; goal-oriented, adaptive	Rapid learning within narrow data-rich tasks; never forgets
Problem Solving	Uses creativity, ethics, empathy to deal with open-ended, "fuzzy" problems	Excels at constrained, rule-based systems; optimization problems
Brainstorming & Prediction	Balances competing priorities and values; accounts for social/emotional consequences of predictions	Simulates millions of possibilities; adapts on the fly; excels in logistics, routing, financial trading
Games & Strategy Tasks	Stronger in open-ended, real-world strategies where rules are unclear or values matter	Outperforms experts in games with defined strategies like chess, Go, poker, StarCraft, etc.
Data Processing & Analysis	Synthesizes across domains; recognizes relevance/importance; interprets findings within social or ethical contexts	Handles massive datasets instantly; finds subtle correlations, anomalies, errors in real time
Perception & Attention	Notices unexpected, contextually meaningful stimuli, integrated across senses and experiences	Can process massive amounts of information from data sources and sensors without error or fatigue
Monitoring & Alerting	Better at prioritizing what matters, avoids false positives by applying judgment	24/7 vigilance across multiple inputs, flag problem data instantly, never distracted
